LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT:

OVER this past
Centennial
year we have
learned how
much
Woman's City
Club has

enriched the community (see video on www.womanscityclub.org). However, it also enriches the lives of its members who devote time and effort to the organization.

Here is an example of how it enriched my life. When I was president in 1998, the City Council was voting on rescinding the campaign finance ordinance that it had enacted a year before.

"Go down to City Council and testify" in favor of keeping the ordinance urged some members of Woman's City Club. "What?" Give a speech before City Council?" on Campaign Finance? I had little knowledge or experience of Campaign Finance up to that point. So, I dug into the research, combed the internet, and talked to others to prepare my speech which I gave before City Council. It did not, however, stop the ordinance from being repealed as the vote was 5 to 4.

The rumor was that one of the council members was promised a big campaign

donation for voting to rescind it. That was the beginning of the effort of a coalition of organizations to collect signatures and put it on the ballot as a Charter Amendment. As such, it would make it more permanent and it could not be voted out by Council. Several members of WCC joined in this effort. I was in charge of the endeavor to collect thousands of signatures. Volunteers from WCC stepped forward to collect them and we even collected twice as many as we needed. Once on the ballot, we mounted a campaign. The ballot measure passed! This was exciting work that I really enjoyed and it made a difference in the city-- one of the many reasons why I enjoy my membership with Woman's City Club. I hope that other members will share their experience and encourage others to join Woman's City Club.

WCC Marijuana Forum in September Engages Packed Room in Lively Discussion.



WCC kicked off our new season of Public Forums with the bold and controversial topic "Legalizing Marijuana -- Is it Responsible for Ohio?"

Over 135 folks gathered at the Red Cross Auditorium Building to "sort through the weeds and find the facts." WCC collaborated with several co-sponsors to present a professional panel of guest speakers to discuss whether or not to legalize marijuana for medical and recreational use. Ohio voters will face a momentous decision on Nov 3.

The purpose of the forum was to provide factual information and discuss pros and cons and other issues related to marijuana legalization. There are passionate arguments for and against legalization in general, as well as other specific proposals.

The panel included representatives from the Responsible Ohio group- Eric Kearney, managing partner of Kearney & Kearney and Jennifer Doering, General Manager of Charles Seligman Distribution Company; Mary Haag, President/CEO of PreventionFIRST! representing the Drug
Free Alliance Group; Dr. Jeffrey Goldsmith
of the Veterans Administration Program
representing issues related to medical
use; and John Burke, Commander,
Greater Warren County Ohio Drug Task
Force, addressing the Colorado
experience with marijuana legalization.
The panel was moderated by Jeffrey Stec
of Citizens For Civic Renewal.

Members of the local press were present, and it was clear at the end of the evening that this issue is packed with passion and complexity. If nothing else, it gave voters a place to start and inspired further research on the issue. Overall, the feedback was very positive with many acknowledging they had no idea how much was involved. Our co-sponsors included the Cincinnatus Association, Citizens for Civic Renewal, AIR, Inc, and the League of Woman Voters of the Cincinnati Area.

ON October 20, WCC presented its second major forum on the newly created initiative, *Thriving Cincinnati*, to a packed room at the First Unitarian Church. Over 65 people attended, and excitement and enthusiasm continue to build over the movement that the Louise Spiegel Subcommittee of Status of Women initiated in May, 2015.

Income inadequacy disproportionally impacts women, children and minorities – always a focus for WCC. The purpose of the *Thriving Cincinnati* (TC) website will be to increase civic engagement around the issue of poverty.

Thriving Cincinnati is envisioned as an invitation and a service to help individuals and groups to connect and collaborate on programs that address income inadequacy. The TC website will become a clearinghouse to gather information, exchange best practices, create and collaborate on programs working toward decreasing poverty in our region, increasing self-sufficiency, and ending inadequate wages and wage theft.

TC created a symbol – a five-faceted crystal representing residents, non-profits, funders, policymakers, and employers. All sectors are intertwined as reflected in the symbol. Let's grow *Thriving Cincinnati* into a region wide movement:

Woman's City Club Endorses CEDAW

WCC has endorsed the Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) and the Cities for CEDAW initiative. We commend the City of Cincinnati for supporting Cities for CEDAW, and we encourage the City to implement the Cities for CEDAW program by reviewing its employment policies, establishing an oversight body and funding actions that promote gender equality and prevent violence against women.

The Community Engagement Initiative Takes a Step Forward

A CENTRAL tenet of WCC's mission is to strengthen the role of the citizen's voice in the governance of our city.

Through our open public forums, action groups, and collaborations, WCC educates the community and



models the democratic process through courageous dialogue and debate. Through our civic engagement Initiatives, we reach out to the community to seek ways of making our collective voices more powerfully heard.

To this end, the Citizen Engagement Action Team (CEAT) has been working for over two years in the City Manager's Office and with the Human Resources Department to build a Community Engagement infrastructure that enables citizens to participate more meaningfully in the decision-making process at City Hall. As reported in the September issue of the Bulletin, our challenge has been to bring about a true culture change within city government. This past week a promising step has been taken. A new city webpage will be launched beginning in November 2015. As a direct result of CEAT's work, there will be a page called *Engage Cincy* on this website devoted to community engagement.

The mission of *Engage Cincy* is to "strengthen the culture of resident engagement in Cincinnati by providing opportunities for everyone to have a meaningful role in city governance, policymaking and problem-solving processes. Residents bring a wealth of expertise, wisdom and experience to the table that can truly beneficial to the role local government plays in bettering Cincinnati."

On the *Engage Cincy* page you will also find the City Manager's *Engage Cincy Challenge Grant*, a program that offers participants a chance to win one of five grants of up to \$10,000 for the development, launch and promotion of innovative projects that better a specific neighborhood or the entire city. Applications are due by Dec. 1, 2015.

Environmental Action




WOMAN'S City Club sponsors a monthly series of community conversations we call Changing CO₂urse: Every

4th Sunday evening we come together to discuss what we can do locally and collectively to meet the environmental/ economic challenges of global climate change.

In September, Ginny Frazier from Alliance for Leadership and Interconnection spoke about her work greening the curriculum in the Cincinnati Public Schools. ALI helped CPS to become the greenest school district in Ohio. Their eco-mentoring programs inspire K-12 students to become environmental ambassadors to our communities.

In October, Dr. Mike Roman offered a compelling presentation on the *Human Faces of Climate Change*, the tragic consequences of Island nations on the front lines of climate change fighting to keep their islands afloat in the Pacific. There is no legal definitions for "climate refuge" so there are no foreseeable solutions. (See November issue of National Geographic: "Cool It")

Doug Bell of the Citizens' Climate Lobby, that same evening, offered possible strategies for addressing such climate crises through carbon fees that favor the bottom line of polluting companies.



The *Changing Course* series will break for the holidays to resume in January. On January 22 we will screen the new film: THIS CHANGES EVERYTHING CAPITALISM VS THE CLIMATE from Naomi Klein's book of the same name.




