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Only 10% of the energy used by an incandescent bulb produces light. The rest is given off as heat.

Compact fluorescent light bulbs are up to 4 times as efficient as incandescent bulbs. CFLs produce the same amount of light, use 1/3 the electricity and last up to 10 times as long.

Her roles have included Strategic Planning Manager and Performance Metric Champion and, more recently, Transition Manager to integrate, and then decouple CWW, the Metropolitan Sewer District, and the Stormwater Management Utility.

According to the nomination, what sets CAAG apart is the heart, soul and reason behind their work. Catalyst for Achievement Action Group was formed as a specific response to the civil unrest in Cincinnati and to the collaborative agreement. WCC members sought a personal yet strategic response, and



determined that one-on-one work with young children was a way to contribute. Understanding the correlation between street violence and literacy, CAAG became actively engaged in tutoring; the group studied the data to outcomes for a lifetime. determine their focus on helping young children learn to read by fourth grade a strong predictor for staying in school and avoiding destructive lifestyles. They found a science-based and measurable approach they could support, and they have been doing this work ever since.

CAAG offers the Making Sense of Language Arts programs for kindergartners at Rothenberg and Winton Hills elementary schools, with additional volunteers at South Avondale schools. Children enter the program with below average language arts skills, and leave with average or better language arts skills. The students also

have gained significant improvement in expressive ability and letter and word skills. Because literacy skills are often a determining factor in school and career success, the CAAG group changes

Results of Woman's City Club Strategic Meeting March 20, 2016

The Woman's City Club Strategic Meeting was held March 20, 2016. 20 members attended—a mix of long-term active members, new members, and returning members.

The facilitator, Marie Gemelli-Carroll of Starboard Strategy, shared a message about evaluating our organization with two important questions:

- How are we relevant and effective in creating the change we want to see in our community?
- How are we sustainable as an organization?

Participants watched Simon Senek's TED Talk, "How Great Leaders Inspire Action". The video helped us examine the WHY of what we do.

This was followed by small group discussions on our beliefs about the WHY of WCCs:

We believe that engaged citizens can empower/strengthen their voices to impact decisions that improve their lives.

We believe a just and sustainable community is one that provides every person with the fundamental right to be educated, informed on all sides of an issue, and the opportunity to question,

express opinions and be involved in decision-making

We believe all citizens deserve an opportunity to shape a better community for all in the region.

We believe our community is stronger when all voices are heard.

We then discussed outcomes WCC strives to produce, based on our stated goals in our mission and vision:

Goal: A just and sustainable community.

Outcomes: Living wage for all, healthy food accessible, equal education, healthy environment, equal justice for all, citizen engagement. All citizens are treated fairly and have an equal chance to lead successful lives.

Goal: Participating Together.

Outcomes: New members are engaged; members feel contributions are valued. We increase reach, representation and engagement in the community.

Goal: Promoting the Common Good.

Outcomes: All have fair opportunity, not just a few; all voices are heard, citizens are thriving, and participating in community.

Goal: Engaged as informed stakeholders.

Outcome: We see more people—more different kinds of people and people who have not been involved before: participating in civic and community organizations; taking initiative to solve problems directly (e.g. tutoring, citizens on patrol, advocating, running for office.) We hear more discussion, more respectful disagreement. We hear from multiple perspectives with ways to act on possible solutions. We see more groups participating in collaborative actions.

The next steps are to determine specific programs, strategies and measures for these outcomes. More discussion of these issues and next steps will be held at our Annual Meeting on June 29. So be there and be ready to work together to move WCC forward into the future.



Preschool Promise Forum

The WCC, along with co-sponsors Cincinnatus and AIR, Inc., hosted a forum on the Preschool Promise initiative at the United Way Convening Center on March 31. Greg Landsman and Stephanie Byrd key leaders of the initiative—presented an informational forum on the updated "Strategic Plan for the Cincinnati Preschool Promise." Mr. Landsman hosted the panel and a moderated Q & A how the funding process will be afterwards.

The Cincinnati Preschool Promise is a cross-sector effort to provide universal access to high-quality affordable preschool for all 3 and 4-year-olds in the city of Cincinnati, building on what preschool programs are already available. The purpose is to give "every child the same fair start [...] to get more

children ready for school, reading successfully by the end of 3rd grade, and graduating from high school prepared for college and careers." The goal is to obtain "a local, 5-10 year sustainable funding stream" to this end.

Over 70 people attended hoping to learn managed. Mr. Landsman told us the last RAND Study is needed to look at how other cities and states have designed and to reach a consensus on all of the above implemented publicly funded preschools. issues. The study will examine such issues as funding mechanisms, governance, ages to be covered, assuring affordability and equity, and the short and long term benefits of expanding preschool.

Unfortunately, the study was not yet available, but several funding options were discussed during the lively and informative question and answer period: sales tax, earnings tax, property tax. Additional questions raised included: how funds would be managed, how "mom and pop" home preschools would be incorporated, who manages the funds, if CPS and preschool promise would work together, and how the issue would be stated on the ballot.

While the community is largely in support of an initiative to increase access to high quality preschool slots, it has yet
