from 11:30 am to 1:00 pm. Ms. Crews is the first Hispanic CEO and general manager of Metro, Greater Cincinnati's transit system. Her topic, "Connecting our Community," addresses the good things that are happening in Cincinnati on the transit front. The event takes place at the Crowne Plaza Hotel, 5901 Pfeiffer Road in Blue Ash.

With more than 20 years in the transit business, most recently heading the transit system in Austin, Ms Crews was appointed to her present position in November 2010. She and the Metro are creating a comprehensive regional transit plan with short-term and long-term service improvements, working with OKI, Agenda 360, Vision 2015 and other transportation partners. At Cincinnati Metro she is responsible for a 347-bus fleet and 844-employee work force that provide about 17 million rides per year on Metro and Access buses.

Middle-East Expert Robin Wright Enlightens at National Speaker Forum

Appearing diminutive at first against the majestic beauty of the soaring ornate ceiling of Plum Street Temple, the 2013 National Speaker Forum lecturer Robin Wright soon had her audience forgetting their surroundings while hanging on every word of her accounts of life and politics in the Middle East.

An award-winning journalist, author and currently senior fellow at both U.S. Institute of Peace and the Wilson International Center, Wright spoke March 14 on the topic, "U.S. Intervention: When is Enough Enough?" She offered her perspectives gained from covering the Middle East since the 1970s as well as her research and writing of three books on the subject.

She is passionate and knowledgeable and shared information about changes in the Middle East that provided a glimpse into the lives of people in these multi-faceted cultures in the age of the Internet and technology, demonstrating more nuance and complexity than even the best news coverage is able to communicate.

As usual with the Forum, the audience questions were thoughtful and insightful, and Wright's gracious responses added to the richness of the lecture. *Continued next page*



"BEFORE IT'S TOO LATE!" What Does That Mean?

In his recent State of the Union address, President Obama said, "For the sake of our children and our future, we must do more to combat climate change; we must act before it's too late."


The President is referring to what scientists call a tipping point of no return. The concept of a tipping point is illustrated by pushing a ball up a hill to the top of the hill and then sending the ball over the top, the tipping point. At that point the ball now rolls unassisted down the hill, gaining momentum as it goes.

A recent scientific study proved beyond doubt that the rapid global climate change we are currently experiencing is caused by human activity, warming the earth to temperatures not reached in the last 11,000 years since the evolution of the human species. The main cause of global warming is use of fossil fuels; coal, oil and natural gas, that when burned release CO₂,

methane and other gases into the atmosphere trapping heat in the same way a greenhouse traps heat. Thus gases released from fossil fuels are commonly called "greenhouse gases."

When the greenhouse gases in the atmosphere reach a certain level, a tipping point of no return is reached. Humans will not be able to reverse the release of new greenhouse gas emissions because the earth will release CO2 and methane gases buried in the oceans and permafrost through feedback loops, selfperpetuating cycles that further increase global temperatures. NASA Scientist, Dr. James Hanson states "the planet will become like Venus. hot and uninhabitable unless we take immediate and drastic action to stop using fossil fuels. The gas and oil industry will soon put the amount of CO₂ and methane into the atmosphere to a level so high that a climate tipping point of no return will be reached."

Dr. Hanson writes, "There is still time to act and avoid a worsening climate, but we are



wasting precious time." Natural systems that have protected the planet from dire climate change are eroding. If they erode enough due to human activity a new global climate will commence that will not support human life on the planet. The major systems scientists monitor are: loss of forests including the Amazon Rain Forest, loss of the cooling white reflective surfaces due to melting of Arctic and Antarctic and Greenland ice and glaciers, rising ocean temperature and melting of permafrost releasing millions of tons of methane gas.

The solution to mitigate climate change is to switch to renewable sources of energy such as wind, solar and

hydroelectric power that do not release greenhouse gases. European countries have quickly moved from fossil fuels, to renewables sources of energy. In order to wean this country off its addiction to fossil fuels we must choose leaders and politicians that appreciate the urgency and necessity to switch to renewables, now, before we reach the tipping point of no return.

Earth Day is April 22nd. Learn more about our planet through the Woman's City Club Sustainable Program series and the Earth Day event at Sawyer Point, Saturday, April 20th, then make a plan and act before it's too late!

CIVIC ENGAGEMENT: ACTIVE ON MULTIPLE FRONTS

1. CAAG: Woman's City Club has continued to sponsor a multi-sensory language arts tutoring program for 26 kindergartners in two Cincinnati Public Schools, Rothenberg and Winton Hills Academies, through our Catalyst for Achievement Action Group (CAAG). The program, designed by Linda Wihl, is for children who can benefit from a weekly, one hour, one on one intervention focusing on learning the building blocks to reading, the skills of listening to and remembering stories, and vocabulary.

The program has an impressive track record. Most children end the school year at or above grade level in language arts. As usual for this time of year, this year's children are reading and writing simple words and many are able to read simple sentences and stories. A field trip to Joseph-Beth Booksellers will take place soon. This is an opportunity for the children to visit a bookstore with rich resources, select a few books to take home, and eat at a restaurant.

After years of financial

support by Women's City Club and its members and St. Bernard's Catholic Church, for the past few years the program has operated through grants from the Nabama Foundation.

2. ROOKWOOD GROUP: Woman's City Club is an active member of the Rookwood Group, which recently formalized its mission as: "a collaborative effort of nonprofit civic organizations committed to working together to improve citizen engagement in our city and region. Our goal is to provide carefully researched and discussed information regarding issues that impact the Greater Cincinnati community." In response to their concerns about the City's proposal to privatize its parking operation, for example, members gathered critical information, shared their concerns with Council and the City Manager, and continue to monitor developments. Last fall, as a "summative" activity for its research and reporting on four-year Council terms, members worked together to present a spirited debate on

the pros and cons of expanding Council terms. Currently we are considering different approaches to programming for the Council and Mayoral elections.

3. CITIZEN ENGAGEMENT PROJECT: Several WCC members are working with an ad hoc group to develop proposals for expanding citizen involvement in City decision-making. The process has involved gathering and analyzing information and models from cities throughout the country as well as models and analyses by professional organizations and scholars.

4. ENVIRONMENTAL
EDUCATION: WCC will
sponsor a monthly Sunday
evening discussion -Changing CO₂urse: Local
Solutions to a Global Crisis -a series of films and
speakers that address the
environmental crisis as a
crisis of conscience. Series
location is St John's UU
Church in Clifton.

The series was launched on March 24 with a public screening of the film RENEWAL. The documentary presents the stories of eight different congregations of different faiths as they combat global warming and the devastation of mountaintop removal, promote food security and environmental justice, recycle and conserve, and teach respect for life on Earth. It shows that when multiplied by the power of community, we can each make a greater difference.

On **April 28**, we will watch the second half of RENEWAL.

On May 26, we will discuss the TRANSITION TOWN initiative, a small-scale local response to the global challenges of climate change, economic hardship, and shrinking supplies of cheap energy. This movement is happening in thousands of communities across the world.

On June 23, we will hear about the CINCINNATI UNION COOPERATIVE INITIATIVE based on the *Mondragon* worker-owned model that began in the Basque region of Spain after the Spanish civil war left the region devastated.
