Uncertainty about the incoming Presidential administration's policies about refugees and undocumented immigrants is alarming many sectors of our community. What is the potential adverse impact on families as well as the economy? What can be done? What can WE do?

The Woman's City Club will present a panel to examine public policies and hear from local residents with real concerns on how immigrants will be affected. The personal stories can help the public gain a better understanding of immigrant law, the legal pathways for immigrants or refugees to become a citizen, challenges they face, and community responses to protecting them.

Panelists:

• The Honorable Marilyn Zayas, immigration attorney and newly elected appellate judge.

• Klara Apro, East European immigrant, will report on her personal experience of naturalization.

• **The Reverend Troy Jackson**, Director of the Amos Project, will speak about the Tri-State Church Sanctuary Initiative.

• Heyda Avira, a DACA college student, will tell us about her deferred action for childhood arrivals designation.

• Arlene de Silva, Executive Director, Asian Community Alliance, will share he citizenship story and serve as moderator

Mayor Cranley Declares Cincinnati a Sanctuary City



The decision on Monday, Jan. 30 2017, was made in bold defiance of President Trump's executive order sharply curtailing immigration and rights of refugees.

The designation "Sanctuary City" is traditionally understood to mean that undocumented immigrants can live in a place where local government will not aid the federal government in deporting them.

Representatives of the City, County, and State as well as spokespersons for religious, cultural and civic groups, as well as the police department and public safety, stood in solidarity to proclaim the city's shared commitment to open its hearts and its doors to those who face threat of deportation. Offering safe sanctuary to those who are most vulnerable do not compromise the safety of our communities.

"This city stands with immigrants," Cranley said during Monday's press conference. "This city stands with Muslims. This city stands with Syria refuges looking to breathe free." And, as PG Sittenfeld, proudly looking around at the crowd in attendance, "This is what Cincinnati looks like!" We are all immigrants!

WOMAN'S MARCH: PROTEST OR MOVEMENT?

The Women's March on Washington January 21 swelled in numbers, multiplied its rallies, and grew into a global movement -- perhaps the largest popular demonstration in history. "Sister marches" proliferated in nearly every state and in countless countries throughout the world.

More pro-women than anti-Trump, the march was an urgent call to action, or, as one organizer put it, "a plan to make a bold and clear statement that we will not be silent and we will not let anyone roll back the rights we have fought and struggled to get."





Many WCC members drove to DC in cars and buses, and many marched right her e in Cincinnati. The event reflected an emerging view of feminism, one not only defined by reproductive issues and equal pay, but also about how challenges faced by women intersect with those encountered by African-Americans, gays and immigrants.

"Women's Rights are Human Rights," as Hillary famously said. Men were



there too to voice their solidarity, and the vast sea of signs spoke to issues ranging from gun control to gender justice, from minimum wage to immigration reform, from clean water to criminal profiling, from climate justice to arming police with military-grade weapons. March on! March on!
