2017 NATIONAL SPEAKER FORUM

Woman's City Club's 24th National Speaker Forum on April 20 celebrates the 102nd year of WCC's history and its contributions to civic reform. This time-honored tradition held each spring brings a nationally known woman to come to Cincinnati and enlighten our community.

This year's forum was held at the Netherland Plaza's Hall of Mirrors and featured guest speaker **Maria Hinojosa**, award-winning broadcast news correspondent and journalist. As anchor and executive producer of the PBS show *America by the Numbers*, Maria covers America's untold stories of Latino and immigrants.



Hinojosa's talk, entitled Latinos and

Immigration: The U.S Mambo, focused on critical issues relative to immigration - an especially timely topic at this critical juncture in our nation's political history. Latinos are the fastest growing demographic in our country but the rhythm of progress has been highly uneven, and this past year progress has taken a steep turn for the worse. Hinojosa's presentation was memorable for its poignant, personal and often humorous stories, revealing the deeper truths and real statistics about our nation's immigration policies. Cincinnati -- now proud to be a Sanctuary City -- loved her! As Susan Noonan says, "Maria is a delightful, intelligent, passionate, and caring person as evidenced by the audience's response to her presentation and her attention to each person at our reception."

And Hinojosa loved Cincinnati! "I will never forget my day in Cincinnati," she said. "Thank you so much for opening your heart and your city to me. What an honor!"

Many thanks to the tireless leadership of the National Speaker committee led by Carole Donnelly and Marge Davis. This year's forum was one of our greatest successes. This annual fundraising event will help finance WCC's civic work. Thank you all for your contributions.


Currence from the League of Women Voters, Barbara Myers from the Women's Political Caucus, and Connie Roesch from the Zonta Club, to name a few.

The local effort was begun by Jan Marie Fritz, a University of Dayton professor, as a class project. As other cities around the country started passing Resolutions, our group expanded, and in 2015, with Council member Chris Seelbach's help, a

CEDAW Resolution was adopted by Cincinnati City Council. When it came to passing an ordinance (since we know a Resolution has no teeth), movement became stalled. The Coalition, now including other groups such as YWCA, The Women's Fund, Tri-State Freethinkers, Amnesty International, Chamber of Commerce, and several departments at University of Cincinnati, continue working under Co-Chairs Susan Noonan and Connie Roesch. Now with Vice Mayor David Mann and his chief of staff, Ioanna Paraskevopoulos, the Law Department has drafted the Ordinance. All of the major "asks" were included: the \$8,000 funding from City, the creation of a task force, the gender analysis study, and recommendations from the task force on actions needed as well as a timeframe and annual progress reviews. We just learned that it is going before Council on May 3 for recommendation to the Finance/Budget committee on May 8. On May 10th we hope for final passage! Come to Budget on May 8th or Council on May 10th to support! This is a major move forward for women and girls in our City!

Our speaker, Major Charmaine McGuffey, is a pioneer in corrections. She was one of the first women deputies in Hamilton County and retired after a career with Hamilton County Sheriff's Department. Sheriff Neil called her back from retirement to run all operations of the Hamilton County Justice Center – a first for a woman! She will tell us about her new program for women heroin addicts in the jail – another first.

THRIVING CINCINNATI AWARD!

On May 1, the Thriving Cincinnati Initiative received an award from the Cincinnati Interfaith Workers Center for its efforts to promote equity for all in wages, stop wage theft, and create a sustained effort to help families achieve livable incomes. Government works best when people pay attention to it. That's why I call this sort of thing Sunlight!" he said.

The play highlights three generations of women throughout the 1950s, 1970s and today. As they face the ripple effect of





Auburn Presbyterian Church 103 William Howard Taft Road. Do you know the legal difference between Immigrants and Refugees? **Immigrants** are subject to the laws of their adopted country. They may only come if they have work or a place to live. **Immigrants** are usually driven by economic factors, or they want to be close to family. **Refugees** are forced to relocate for reasons such as fear of persecution due to war, religion or political opinion.



Saturday, May 20, 10 pm WCC BOOK CLUB FOR MAY: David Pepper's *The People's House*

The Wall Street Journal crowned David Pepper's *The People's House* the "sleeper for political thriller of the year," and a former Governor said she almost missed her connecting flight because she couldn't put it down.

It's the story of the political reporter Jack Sharpe, who is logging time at the tail end of a disappointing career -- jaded about politics and stung by personal hard knocks. But after an odd election result in the Ohio Congressional district he covers, Sharpe stumbles across voting irregularities that spur him to dig deeper. The story takes him far beyond his corner of Ohio as he discovers an international plot one that strikes at the heart of American democracy. His reporting leads to a showdown with a philandering Congressman and Presidential contender, and an eccentric but deadly Russian mogul. In order to save himself and the country, Sharpe must rekindle his old fire to navigate a treacherous journey through danger, betrayal, and atonement. And yes, it was all written before eerily similar events occurred in the 2016 election!


