

The Seasongood Foundation Supports WCC's 2018 National Speaker Forum

Woman's City Club is very pleased to announce that the Murray and Agnes Seasongood Good Government Foundation has awarded a \$6,000 grant to the 2018 National Speaker Forum (NSF). The impact of this grant is two-fold: it helps assure the financial success of the event despite the ever-increasing costs, and it allows WCC to extend the outreach of journalist Martha Raddatz's presentation by distributing tickets free of charge to organizations and individuals who might not otherwise be able to attend the program.

WCC's first National Speaker Forum brought President Woodrow Wilson to Cincinnati in October 1916 to speak on international relations as the United States moved closer to involvement in World War I. Though our country is not as perilously close to war as it was then, North Korea's missile tests, continued violence in the Mideast, and deteriorating

relationships with many countries have given many Americans cause for grave concern. The NSF Committee believes that Martha Raddatz, Chief Global Affairs Correspondent for ABC News, can speak credibly and powerfully about the United States' role in foreign relations.

Raddatz knows first-hand not just the facts and issues but also the people and places, the cultures and causes. In an era where people are too often informed by sound bytes and unsubstantiated statements on social media, Raddatz offers thoughtful analysis and reliable authority. In her presentation, Raddatz will speak from the heart and from experience, help us understand the cause and effect relationships in foreign policy, and perhaps lead us back to informed, civil discourse—a goal very much in line with the Seasongood Foundation's purpose of "promoting citizen participation and educational programs for government reform."

WCC hopes Martha Raddatz will open up a dialogue that will bring all

constituencies into the conversation. Toward that end, \$2,000 of the grant will be used to underwrite the distribution of free tickets to a range of stakeholders who might not otherwise attend the National Speaker Forum.

While WCC presents the National Speaker Forum to address timely topics of great importance, it also relies on the event as a major source of operating funds. To close the gap between civic engagement and financial need, WCC seeks contributions from many sponsors, patrons, and donors. The Seasongood Foundation grant is the single largest source of funding for the Forum. WCC is proud of its long-standing relationship with the Murray and Agnes Seasongood Good Government Foundation—Agnes Seasongood was a WCC member in the early years of the club—and deeply grateful for the Foundation's generous support that allows us to put into action our mission to educate, empower, and engage.

CINCINNATI LEEDS THE NATION.

America's First Net-Zero Energy Police Station

Woman's City Club joined the League of Women Voters, the Cincinnati Women's Political Caucus, the Citizens Climate Lobby, and St. John's Green Sanctuary Partners on Saturday, Feb. 24, to cosponsor a public screening of former councilwoman and award-winning filmmaker, **Laure Quinlivan's** PBS documentary at St. John's UU Church in Clifton. Over 50 citizens participated in the post-film discussion with panelists Laure Quinlivan, District 3 Captain **Paul Broxterman**, former District 3 Captain **Aaron Jones**, and **Larry Falkin**,

Director of the Office of Environment and Sustainability.




The half-hour film tells the story of the construction of the new Cincinnati Police District 3 Westside headquarters. Cincinnati is the first city in the nation to have such a Net-Zero Energy Police Station. We can also boast that it is the city's first large-scale design-build and its first LEED Platinum building. It is also the first time Cincinnati included citizens in the site selection. It's the first time the city included public art and reserved 1% for art in any construction budget.

The City of Cincinnati hired LQ Consulting to document construction knowing the project would claim a number of "firsts." Laure volunteered her time to raise private funding to make this documentary possible. The primary sponsors are Frisch's and the Stephen H. Wilder Foundation.

The film is timely since taxpayers will soon be funding a new District 5 station. We were all persuaded that we must convince our city leaders to follow the same model and engage the residents of Camp Washington, Clifton, Mt. Airy, and Northside in planning the new District 5.

MEMBER PROFILE: ERNA OLAFSON

Erna grew up in Ithaca, N.Y. After several months in Tel Aviv with her family (where her father was with the Foreign Service), she attended Barnard College and then spent a

year in Cold War Berlin on a Fulbright.

In 1963, she drove with friends across country to Berkeley, California, to see what it was like and stayed there 30 years. While there, she married, had three children, and accumulated doctorates in European History and Clinical Psychology. She taught at Stanford, Berkeley, UC Santa Cruz and a private high school, and co-authored her first book, *Victorian Women*, Stanford Press, 1981.

"This was one of the first women's studies books to appear," she said. "I recall that its publication was a Big Deal for Stanford, which enjoyed being ahead of the curve on feminist issues." Erna moved to Cincinnati in 1994 for a job at Cincinnati Children's Hospital and UC

Medical School, focusing on prevention, intervention and treatment for childhood trauma and maltreatment.

She helped found CCHMC's Mayerson Center for Safe and Healthy Children. "We became part of the National Child Traumatic Stress Network funded by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration in 2002," she said.

Although retired, she is still funded in the Network for a day a week to continue her focus on treatment for traumatized adolescents in the juvenile justice system. She retired from CCHMC in January 2017 and is *emerita* at the medical school. Cambridge Press published her second co-authored book, *Trauma and Grief Component Therapy for Adolescents*, in January 2018.

Erna is grateful to Sarah Gideonse, who brought her into WCC in 2010. "The National Speakers and the book club are among my favorite WCC activities," she said. She enjoys reading, singing, listening to classical music, watching birds, and spending time with friends and her children and grandchildren.

WCC MEMBER LOSES GRANDDAUGHTER IN FLORIDA SCHOOL MASSACRE

Jamie Guttenberg, 14-year-old granddaughter of Ethel and Marvin Guttenberg and niece of Dr. Abbie and John Youkilis of Amberley Village, was one of the 17 students and teachers killed in the school shooting at Marjorie Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, on Valentines Day.

Ethel Guttenberg is a long-time member of Woman's City Club. The members of

WCC offer Ethel their sincerest condolences and deepest expression of comfort and support.

Youkilis describes her niece as an intelligent and feisty girl who wanted to be a mother and occupational therapist. "She was a pretty girl with the world's best smile and her soul was sensitive and compassionate," she said. "She always looked out for the underdog and the bullied, and she probably had been kind to the

student who shot her." Jamie was one of the first victims identified, USA Today

reported. Jamie's father Fred Guttenberg told his friends, "We lost our daughter and my son Jesse Guttenberg lost his sister. I am broken as I write this trying to figure out how my family gets through this."





In *Women & Power*, she traces the origins of misogyny to its ancient roots, examining the pitfalls of gender and the ways that history has mistreated strong women since time immemorial. It arrives at a moment of heightened awareness of the silencing Beard describes. She also suggests remedies. Published 2017; 99 pages. THE INTIMATE REALITIES OF WATER

Post-film discussion with the film's co-producer **Sean Hughes**, photojournalist and UC Assistant Professor of Journalism, and **Jon Hughes**, Director of Photography for the documentary



Local water is "high" on people's minds these days. Downtown streets are flooded by a swollen Ohio River. Basements are inundated and rising sewer rates are putting many "under water." Sanitary sewer overflows (SSO) are a chronic and growing problem in this country and pose a serious risk to public health and the environment.

As we have all seen with the recent problems uncovered in Flint, Michigan, it's easy for most of us to take clean water for granted. Until we can't easily get it! In many parts of the world, such as Nairobi, it's a rare commodity. This film shows how everyday realities affect people who dwell in the slums of Nairobi. It is an alarming harbinger of the intensifying water problems around the world.

"It tells the story of water as a social force, following the fascinating ways water constitutes bodies, cities, economic life, cultural activities, bringing these into relationship with one another."

Or those spaces where fragility and strength greet each other. Here water lengthens the day, organizing the very texture and tempo of people's lives.




